Infection Control	Staff, Pupils & Visitors	Staff Contracting Covid – 19	Staff are encouraged to continue weekly home testing in line with PHE/DfE guidance whenever they are due to come into school. Any staff member with symptoms of COVID-19 is sent home to self-isolate for 10 and instructed to undertake a PCR test.	Medium	Yes	





Pupils Contracting	<ul> <li>The 10-day self-isolation period for those who record a positive PCR test result for Covid-19 has been reduced to 7 days in most circumstances, unless you cannot test for any reason, and the DfE has confirmed that this applies to those who attend schools.</li> <li>Individuals may now take rapid lateral flow tests on day six and day seven of their self-isolation period. If those test results are negative they no longer have to complete 10 full days of self-isolation.</li> <li>Where an LFD test returns a positive result the staff member must self-isolate and arrange a PCR test.</li> <li>Anyone having to go home will be encouraged to not use public transport where this is applicable.</li> <li>Parents are asked to communicate with staff via telephone calls or emails. There will be no 'face to face' meetings on site unless there are extenuating circumstances e.g. a pupil is at high risk.</li> <li>Parents who need to speak to staff who are supervising the entrance doors at the beginning or end of the day will be required to wear a face covering to protect themselves and the</li> </ul>
Covid – 19	<ul> <li>member of staff.</li> <li>Where a PCR test returns a positive result: <ul> <li>The staff member must notify the school of the test result immediately.</li> <li>The staff member self-isolates in line with self-isolation guidance.</li> </ul> </li> <li>If the PCR test result is negative the staff member can return to school when they feel well enough to do so.</li> </ul>





Visitors Contraction Covid	<ul> <li>Any fully vaccinated staff identified as close contacts of a positive case are advised to carry out a PCR test and are also advised to carry out an LFD test each day prior to attending work.</li> <li>Any pupil with symptoms of COVID-19 are advised to selfisolate and undertake a PCR test.</li> <li>The pupil/parents are asked to notify the school of the test result.</li> <li>A negative PCR test result means the pupil can return to school.</li> <li>Anyone having to go home will be encouraged to not use public transport where this is applicable.</li> <li>Clinically extremely vulnerable pupils can attend unless under specific medical advice not to do so.</li> <li>Pupils/children who are required to quarantine having recently</li> </ul>
Isolation for close contacts	<ul> <li>visited a county outside the common travel area are asked to follow the most recent government guidelines.</li> <li>Visitors to school are minimised to professionals only. All visitors to the school site will be asked to have completed a LFT before arriving and to have logged their result with Track &amp; Trace. They should follow the process as above for staff if an LFT is positive</li> <li>Visitors are asked to follow their own company's policy and procedures regarding health and safety onsite. They are required to wear a face covering whilst in school.</li> <li>As before, those who are fully vaccinated, or pupils and young</li> </ul>
	people aged between 5 and 18 and a half, who have been identified as a close contact of someone with Covid, are strongly advised to take a lateral flow test every day for seven days and, unless they have a positive test result or develop symptoms at any time, they should continue to attend their setting as normal.

- Class bubbles will be reinstated if advised by the local outbreak team (Staffordshire) due to rising cases.
- Bubbles will remain during Before & After school club.

#### **Using the Hall**

- The hall can be used by year group bubbles but windows will be open to ensure good ventilation. No cross year group activities will take place in the hall.
- <u>Lunchtimes will be staggered and restricted to certain year</u> group bubbles. Some older children will eat their lunches in their classrooms.
- Nursery children have their lunch in the nursery classroom and do not come over to the main building.

#### **Swimming & Clubs**

- Clubs that take place outside will continue but be regularly reviewed.
- Swimming will continue but will be reviewed with the provider and coach company if cases begin to rise within the year groups that attend.

### P.E Kits

• PE Kits can be worn on the day that pupils are timetabled for PE. Suitable tracksuit bottoms and tops only. No football shirts or large logos.

# 1:1 Support & Restraint

- Seek expert guidance regarding support for children with behaviour difficulties who may need restraining, those who bite or spit.
- Individual behaviour plans indicate specific risks and strategies.
- Reduced timetable, exclusion considered as a last resort for those children putting staff or others at risk.







<b>Entering &amp; Leaving</b>	School
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- '<u>Staggered Starts & Finish' times</u> and procedures are in place to reduce pupil ques when entering the building <u>and year group bubbles meeting.</u>
- Staff supervise allocated doors for different year groups to ensure pupils don't gather in large groups. <u>Staff on duty to</u> wear face coverings
- Parents are allocated a specific space in the playground when collecting children to minimise community spread.
- Parents are encouraged to stand two meters apart, face coverings are optional.

#### Cleaning

- A cleaning schedule is in place with an emphasis on frequently touched surfaces including tables and door handles.
- Cleaning following confirmed/suspected case carried out in accordance with PHE guidance COVID-19: cleaning of nonhealthcare settings
- Tables and eating area are cleaned between year groups and at the end of the session.
- Pupils are encouraged to wash or sanitise hands regularly throughout the day.
- 'Catch it, Bin it, Kill it' routines are in place across the whole school.

## **Outbreak Management Plans**

- Mechanisms are in place for the rapid deployment of enhanced control measures, e.g. face coverings, bubbles, staggered starts should the school be advised to do so by a relevant body (central government, Local Director of Public Health).
- Measures to keep as many pupils in school as possible
- The education secretary has conceded that where staff absences are substantial, avoiding remote learning would be 'impossible'.
- However, he stated that as many pupils should receive faceto-face teaching as possible.







WOLVERHAMPTON We will consider combining class groups to ensure pupils remain in school during periods of high teacher absence due to Covid. • We will only return to remote learning if: • We are advised to do so during discussions with the Local Public Health Team. • We are unable to deliver face to face learning due to significant staff shortages. The decision to return to remote learning will not be taken lightly and only as a last resort. All vulnerable pupils will remain in school for learning, even if their bubble or class is sent home. • If any vulnerable pupil has to isolate because they test positive for Covid, then regular contact must be made on a daily basis with the child & whoever is supervising them at home. Any 'vulnerable' pupils will be prioritised for face to face learning in the event of the need to return to remote procedures for their class. The definition of a vulnerable children has been updated and is as follows: those with a social worker those with an Education, Health and Care Plan a group of children considered locally, including by settings and local authorities, to be 'otherwise vulnerable' DfE said this has now been expanded to: children known to children's social care services in the past children whose home circumstances might be particularly challenging because of domestic abuse, parental offending, adult mental health issues, and drug and alcohol addiction.
